How to Find Articles in a Database

Step 1: Choose your database.

- For general interest topics, use Academic Search Complete (box on Articles tab).
- For discipline-specific articles (Psychology, Art, etc.), see Resources By Subject.

Step 2: Try out some keywords.

- Which words & phrases describe your topic?
- Narrow your topic by choosing multiple keywords.
 - o "Climate change AND energy" returns fewer results than just "climate change."

Step 3: Locate the subject labels and do a subject search.

- Subject labels = how this database likes to talk about your topic.
- Find by clicking on an article title and looking in the record.
- Do a new search using the label make sure you change the drop-down menu!

Tip: *Keep track of your topic's subject labels so you only have to find them once!*

Step 4: Too many hits? Add more keywords. Find their labels. Do another subject search.

• You can combine a subject label (*Climatic changes*) with a keyword (*polar bears*). Just be sure to put them in different search boxes!

Step 5: Use search filters to further refine your results.

• Tell the database what you want! Last 5 years? Magazine or academic journal?

Step 6: Get your hands on the article. Grab the citation information.

• No full text? Use the green "Article Linker" button!
